Dear friend George:

Would suggest that you just let it rest until you see me in person and we can then decide on what we are going to do. Don't worry about the brothers address or the five dollars you owe him. We will make good use of that some time even if I have to send a messenger to you to take care of it. Would judge from your letter that you did not overlook the enclosure for the south; however as we have the receipt it will be an easy matter to look it up. There is no great hurry and this matter also can rest until I see you in person.
