My dear friend George:

Had rather expected to hear from you ere this time either directly or indirectly but to date such is not the case. Maybe we are too prone to make schedules for other people to follow; no doubt everything will turn out O.K. in its own good time. I trust that you are perfectly clear on the things we talked over Saturday and that you will not let anything stand in your way as to carrying out your plans in the way outlined and at the time agreed upon. This is quite important as I see it. Everything is going ~~ix~~ along here in about the same old way. Nothing new or startling.

Once upon a time I cautioned you about being careful as to just what you said and to whom you said it. Since your last visit I received a little information that was some surprise to me and I believe it would be well for me to repeat my caution once more. I will give you the details when next I see you. They will keep until that time.
