Dear friend Bill:

Your telegram received this morning; it was fine. I owe Morrin a letter and am dropping him a line in today's mail in which I am suggesting your name to him; should you make the trip no one will be more pleased than myself. Ed Nockels, of Chicago, was out this way recently and called on me last week; no doubt he will report to Morrin when he returns East for they were in conference before Ed left for the West. There is nothing definite as near as I can learn; everything seems to be tied up until some time next month. You were in my mind all the time but I was under the impression that you would not like to leave your family just at this time or I should have broached the proposition to you in some of my letters. When Nockels was here I mentioned to him about the possibility of Morrin coming out also spoke to him about Sherman, and then suggested one of the Cleveland bunch, having yourself in mind. I of course told him that I did not include the ex-president and he seemed to understand.

Morrin wrote me a day or so ago that my particular case was considered at the recent Board meeting and that he would have a vice-president Scahill call on me and explain just what took place. Will keep you posted. Owe the Deters a letter; tell them I have not forgotten them and shall write them shortly. This is just a note. I want to write to Morrin so excuse brevity.
